September 29th

Welcome back, friends, to our Tuesday September 29th edition of "Take a Breather". I'm Danny Buckner and it's my privilege to serve as music director for Central Methodist Church in Shelby, NC. Let's sit back, take a deep breath, and relax a bit...ahhhh.

Have you ever fallen down? Yeah? Well, I certainly have to. As a kid I spent a ton of time outside...mostly on my bike or in a tree and those two endeavors often started and/or ended in a fall of some sort and said fall was always prefaced with words like..."Watch me! I'll do it!!"

Even as an adult I've had my share of falls and sometimes they came purely by accident, but more often than not they happened attempting that same "Watch me! I'll do it! Philosophy...(just ask our horse...yes, that's (continued on page 4)

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another story and no I'm not gonna tell that one here! J)

And it's not really the falling that's hard, is it? For me, that often came quite easily! It's the ground that's hard and it's the getting up that's hard. But we get up anyway because that's what we do. Falling can be a harsh, but good teacher if we let it.

This brings me to our devotional for today. It comes from a book titled *Daily Guideposts 2020* and is written by Marilyn Turk. I've titled this one...

Falling Down and Getting Up

But you, Lord, do not be far from me.

You are my strength; come quickly to help me.

Psalm 22:19 (NIV)

My husband, Chuck, and I stood on the sidelines watching our grandson Logan play soccer. At eight years old, soccer was the only sport he'd tried that he liked well enough to continue.

But Logan likes attention, even if it's not for the right things. In the running scramble that characterizes youth soccer, kids often fall down. And Logan was usually the one who fell down the most. While the game continued, he lay there, waiting for someone to notice.

We're not unsympathetic, but we knew he wanted special attention even if it meant interfering with the game. When we and the coaches called to him to get up, he did, often limping to the bench for sympathy. After the game, he'd show us where he got hurt, invisible to the naked eye.

This was the same child who ran with abandon when playing chase with his friends, bouncing back up if he fell down lest he miss the fun. How could we get him to do the same in soccer?

Trying to emphasize the importance of getting back up again, we offered motivational advice.

"Everyone falls down, but you have to get back up to play the game." "You're tough. You can take it." Your team needs you to play."

Eventually, Logan caught on and started getting up quickly when he fell down. As a result, he contributed to the success of his team.

Sometimes, I get knocked down too. Not physically, like Logan, but by emotional blows and frustrations. It's tempting to lie there and feel sorry for myself. But like Logan, I have to get up again, and the quicker I do, the more productive I am. I may not feel strong enough at times, but thank God, He has enough strength for us both.

Prayer: Thank you, God, for the strength to get back up when I'm down.

And I (Danny) say... "Amen, Sister!"

Let's close our time together with the Prayer of Saint Francis...

Lord, make me an instrument of your peace

Where there is hatred, let me sow love

Where there is injury, pardon

Where there is doubt, faith

Where there is despair, hope

Where there is darkness, light

And where there is sadness, joy

O Divine Master, grant that I may

Not so much seek to be consoled as to console

To be understood, as to understand

To be loved, as to love

For it is in giving that we receive

And it's in pardoning that we are pardoned

And it's in dying that we are born to Eternal Life

September 30th:

Have you ever watched a time travel movie where the main character keeps going back in time to try to fix things, but when he comes back to the present, he's made things worse? That's what 2020 has felt like! It seems like we just find our footing with one crisis when another erupts. This turbulent world, turned upside down by calamities, catastrophes and sickness, is crying out for a generation of people, filled with the Holy Spirit, who get their strength from God to live in a way that matters.

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We've all been deeply touched and changed by the adversity of this season. Your adversity may have included a broken relationship. It could have been a time of battling anxiety, illness, loss of someone you loved, financial hardships or even a pattern of thoughts that tore you down. Every person's battle is unique.

And because of that truth, our calling is clear. Our calling is to know Him, and our mission is to show Him. We're not called to be people-pleasers but God-pleasers. We aren't called to give up when times get hard but to give in to God's will and draw strength from Him.

If you are a believer, the Holy Spirit lives in you. We can't keep walking around feeling powerless, like life is happening to us and we are victims. The Spirit of God lives inside us, empowering us every single day no matter what the world throws at us.

And no matter what lies the world throws at you, the truth is that you are worthy because Christ in you is worthy. You are worthy of love because Jesus loves you. You are worthy of more in this world because He empowers you.

Sermon for September 27, 2020 Stay in Love with God

Colossians 2:6-7

"My counsel for you is simple and straightforward: Just go ahead with what you've been given. You received Christ Jesus, the Master; now *live* him. You're deeply rooted in him. You're well constructed upon him. You know your way around the faith. Now do what you've been taught. School's out; quit studying the subject and start *living* it! And let your living spill over into thanksgiving."

The word of God for the people of God... thanks be to God.

Did you see the story of Lucille and Marvin Stone this past week. This sweet couple from Nebraska celebrated their 60^{th} wedding anniversary. I must say, I was pretty impressed. Not that they were married 60 years - no! The amazing thing to me was that they had pictures taken in their original wedding clothes. So how many of you could get married in your original wedding clothes. Yea, that's what I thought...

Married Aug. 21, 1960, Lucille, now 81, said she had to alter her dress a bit at the waist — the 40 buttons down the back were unforgiving. But 88-year-old Marvin had no problems. As Lucille put it, "He can still get in his army uniform from 1953. No matter what I cook, and I think I feed him pretty well, he never gains any weight." Isn't that irritating???

So what's the secret to staying married 50, 60, 70 or more years? I started asking around because I hope Glenn and I have that blessing. Now, I'm not stupid enough to think we are going to get into our size 5 gown or 28 inch waist tuxedo pants... but maybe we can learn how to keep fanning the flames of love by those who are still in love. Here are some things I learned are important to stay in love...

Be Best Friends – Spend time together, Respect; be willing to do things the other person enjoys

Remember your vows – Respect the promises you made

Patience

Embrace your individuality and encourage your partner's

Never stop showing affection

Have a standing date – without the kids

Pick your battles

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Remember what is really important in life

Marriage is not 50/50 or meeting half way-marriage is giving 100% and traveling the distance

Communicate – includes listening and placing yourself in the other person's position; don't go to bed angry Sense of humor

Oh and 1 more thing – when it gets really hard (and it probably will at some point if you are normal) don't hesitate to get help

I have never met a married couple that didn't want to be married forever. But I have met quite a few that lost their way, somehow, taking that beginning love for granted and losing the "happily ever after" life they had envisioned.

What is even more interesting to me is how similar marriage is to our relationship with God. As a matter of fact bride, bridegroom, and marriage are often used in Scripture to describe God's relationship with God's people.

The past several weeks we have been talking about Wesley's 3 Simple Rules... guidelines for those with a deep desire for receiving and living out their salvation and keeping God as each person's most important priority and 1st love.

Let's see if we remember the 1st two rules: 1) Do no harm and 2) Do good.

So this week is the third rule: Stay in love with God. Wesley actually stated: Attend upon the ordinances of God. I am so glad we have modernized the language to Stay in love with God. It feels for me much more relational and less lawful. Wesley and the United Societies created this rule with the intention of reminding us of the spiritual disciplines that allow us to deepen our relationship with God. They included disciplines like community worship, holy communion, prayer, reading and studying the Scriptures and fasting. We might want to add meditation, journaling, serving and more. I love a quote from *Illuminated Life* by Joan Chittister that speaks of the importance of disciplines: "All we have in life is life. Things – the cars, the houses, the educations, the jobs, the money – come and go, turn to dust between our fingers, change and disappear... the secret of life... is that it must be developed from the inside out." When we live in the presence of God, when we follow Jesus Christ, when we allow the Holy Spirit to guide and direct us we live life from the inside out. Those disciplines keep us in love with God, allowing us to hear, live out and respond to God's love for us, God's presence in our daily lives, and the ability to follow God's direction.

Bishop Rueben P. Job wrote this tiny book, Three Simple Rules: A Wesleyan Way of Living. I encourage you to order one from Cokesbury. It is filled with such great insight. In writing of this 3rd rule, Staying in Love with God, I was so moved by Bishop Job's reminder of Jesus' reinstatement of Peter following his resurrection. Remember, 3 times Jesus asks Peter the question, "Do you love me?" Each time Peter responds, "yes." As Bishop Job puts it, "Staying in love with God was the primary issue of a faithful life then, and it is today. For from such a life of love for God will flow the goodness and love of God to the world. It can be no other way." In other words, if we truly love God, everyone will know it. Our loyalty to God will be witnessed by our words and actions as we live a life of faithfulness, devotion and integrity.

Just like a long-married couple we are called to commit to staying in love with God. Not the childish, lustful love of youth, but the mature, pledged and devoted love of disciples. And just like a married couple, it requires a lot of effort by spending time with God, reading God's word, studying its meaning. We communicate with God through prayer – and that means listening to God at least as much as speaking. We remember and claim the promises God has made to us and we remember and renew our promises to God. We give it our best and our all, not our leftovers. And when we mess up (oh and we will) we know that God will give us God's best, pouring over us grace and forgiveness that we may have the humility and courage to return to God. And one last thing, when it gets difficult, we will have the church, the people of God to help us grow.

I adore my husband. And I really hope that we can spend many more years together. I hope you have experienced that kind of love from another human being. But my greatest desire is for you to fall, passionately in love with our God. That you may know how crazy God is about you, loving you with such a depth that absolutely nothing can ever separate you from God's love for you. I pray you will commit, really commit to your relationship with God, working to make it the BEST relationship you will ever have with anyone or anything. And as you grow more in love with God each day, may you be a living witness to the world.

May it be so... In the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit.
